# Eco Tips

Autumn is here so it's time to plan for the next few months.

Firstly, if you can find a safe space, put up a bird feeder. If you know what kinds of birds you may attract in your area then you can use feed that is appropriate. Provide some water too so that birds can drink.

Secondly, plant some spring bulbs. If you don't have a garden space you can use a pot, or pots. Spring flowers are important for the first bees that emerge in the spring so choose a selection of bulbs to provide a variety of flowers.

Thirdly, create an indoor garden using house plants or flowers that overwinter such as pansies. Succulents are easy to look after and offer a beauty all of their own. Choose a light space in the building and encourage children to take care of it.

This year's season of creation is coming to an end but it's important that we continue the task of taking action for creation throughout every season.
