Rosemary and Ian can say - without grand-parental bias (!) - that Fay is a considerate and generous child as the following will testify.

Until recently Fay had beautiful, slightly curly, long, black locks that, when wet, reached almost to her backside! She had been keeping them long so that a child less fortunate than herself could one day wear it with pride. She was desperate to have her hair cut ,but has been soooo patient so that she would be able to give even more! Making a wig from donated hair costs money (£700), so to complete her gift *any* donation/sponsorship towards that cost would be greatly appreciated.

Amanda's Eco-Message of the Month: October

With potential frosts in the weather forecast and temperatures dropping, suggest that you:

gather in any fruit, such as melons for storage, as frost will make them go mushy,

make sure you have coverings (eg old curtains/sheets) to protect vulnerable plants,

check doors and windows for draughts, and fix draught stoppers to prevent heat loss.

If you have birds' nest boxes, now is the time to clean them out and disinfect them by pouring boiling water into them, so that birds can safely roost in them overwinter.

My 6 months probation period is now over. Where has the time gone?! My 16 hour week has been full since I first started and I have thoroughly enjoyed supporting Mark and the pastorate. However, I had to make Mark aware that I am unable to fit in all that is being asked of me to do, especially the roles that are not included on my Job Description. This is no one's fault as we are all learning to understand the priorities required of the new admin role. Please pray as we meet jointly with the Elders to discuss this and other important items on Thursday 3rd October.

From Mark

Over the past two weeks, we held our annual Commissioning Service at Broxbourne, a cherished event where we formally recognize those entrusted with new and those continuing with responsibilities following our Annual General Meeting. This tradition is not only a significant start to the church year but also a reflection of biblical commissioning practices. It was

a joyful occasion as we launched our pastorate theme of Harmony and also welcomed four new members into our congregation, marking their formal inclusion in our church community.

At Cheshunt, we have launched a clean-up and clear-out campaign, beginning with painting the church's external border and preparing the planter. The effort has already borne fruit, as community members have noticed our work and generously offered support. One individual contributed financially, and another donated a variety of plants and shrubs. Next month, we are looking forward to holding a church-wide clear-out day as part of this ongoing initiative. In addition, our Harmony-themed outreach continues with an open house and coffee morning planned for Saturday, 5th October, offering a free and welcoming space for the wider community. Please see the attached poster. We hope that many of you can also come and support the event.

Finally, as this is my final year serving as convenor of the business committee, we are making plans for the appointment of a new convenor. I attended a 24 hour residential where we made plans for the General Assembly in July 2025, when I will step down from the role, and for the Extraordinary General Assembly in November 2025, which will focus on the Church Life Review. We discussed vital topics, including church structure, ministerial posts, resourcing local churches, funding for the URC colleges in Scotland, Manchester, and Cambridge.




