July Prayer Themes – Faith in the Everyday	

This month, we pray through the steady days of Ordinary Time - not to escape the world, but to engage it with eyes open to God's presence. These prayers help us live faithfully in the small things, where God's love is just as powerful.

Week 1: Everyday Faithfulness

Scripture: "Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much..." (Luke 16:10)

Focus: Pray for grace to be faithful in the small tasks. Ask God to shape your heart through daily routines, simple kindness, and quiet service.

Week 2: Rest and Renewal

Scripture: "Come to me, all you who are weary... and I will give you rest." (Matthew 11:28)

Focus: Offer thanks for the gift of rest. Pray for those who carry heavy burdens and need space to breathe, heal, and be renewed in body, mind, and spirit.

Week 3: Paying Attention to God

Scripture: "Surely the Lord is in this place - and I did not know it." (Genesis 28:16)

Focus: Pray for an awareness of God's presence in your everyday surroundings. Ask for a heart that notices beauty, need, and opportunity to love.

Week 4: Becoming Like Christ

Scripture: "Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 2:5)

Focus: Pray for the Spirit to shape us in humility, compassion, and courage. Lift up our church community as we seek to reflect Jesus in all we do.

### From Stepanka

Over the last month, there have been several business meetings taking place – Cheshunt Elders, Broxbourne Elders and Broxbourne Church meeting with AGM. We will be meeting with Hertford Elders on 1st July.

I have done a lot of research to help with successful recruitment process of the part-time Children's and Youth Worker. A fine-tuned advertisement and job description are almost ready to go public in the hope of attracting suitable candidates and appointing at the end of August. Your prayers are urgently needed.

I held a group safeguarding training session at Broxbourne last week. It went well despite the very warm weather - all participants achieved their Foundation Level certificate. Thank you to all who attended and James and Mark for helping to set up. I am happy to report that across the pastorate

70% of people have now completed their DBS checks and 80% their Safeguarding Foundation Level Training.

My working hours will go back to 4 hours per day Monday to Friday from next month. The safeguarding project has been very time consuming, encroaching on my admin work. It is still not finished. All safeguarding work will be absorbed into my admin hours going forward as I do not wish to extend my hours any further. Thank you for your patience and continued cooperation.

Please note that there will be no pastorate updates over the next 2 months due to holidays. Mark will be away from 10th to 22nd July and I will be visiting my family in Czechia from 23<sup>rd</sup> July to 6th August. We will both need time to catch up after our holidays. We hope you will all have a lovely, relaxing summer!

Finally, you may have heard the All Nations' announcement which came out at the end of last month. The college is preparing to leave Easneye by autumn 2026. This doesn't mean that All Nations are closing, only that, with God's help, they will be operating differently in the future to better fulfil their mission. At **Hertford**, we marked a joyful occasion with a special birthday tea for Fran in celebration of a significant birthday. It was a warm and thoughtful gathering, full of appreciation and good cheer.

I also helped Fran prepare the church sanctuary for the visit of the Mill Mead School Choir, who took part in the Sunday service on 22nd June. The church members were looking forward to welcoming them and sharing in a service enriched by music and young voices.

Our weekly Open House continues to be well attended, with the hot potato lunch on the second Thursday bringing people together for conversation, warmth, and a shared meal. In practical news, the <u>roof repairs</u> at Cheshunt are now complete - thanks especially to Jenny's efforts - a significant and necessary improvement to the life of the building.

Looking beyond the pastorate, I will be attending the URC General Assembly 4-7th July, where I serve as Convenor of the Business Committee. This is my final year in the role, which in part, involves preparing the agenda, which includes papers to be discussed, worship, Bible study, and presentations, and ensuring that the business runs smoothly and on time throughout the four days. # <u>Commitment for Life</u> Update from Zimbabwe

When her family farm began struggling, Blessings' husband moved to the city to find work.

"Things were hard," remembers Blessings. "We were living hand-to- mouth and had to wait for provisions to be sent from my husband. I found life really tough – doing everything on my own, trying to get something out of the land in drought. When I managed to harvest something, I couldn't get decent prices."

Blessings tells how things changed for herself and the wider community with the coming of BRACT, a *Commitment for Life* sponsored project in Zimbabwe. "The project taught us about disaster risk management, and this helped us plan what we need to do in case of droughts and even price fluctuations. The 'climate smart' agriculture training made us realise we can use less fertilisers, farm without cattle to help us plough and still get a harvest even when the rainfall is low. We can also grow feed for our livestock in our fields and make hay for the cattle and goats. This was all completely new to us."

Thank you to you for your wonderful support for BRACT through *Commitment for Life*. People all across Zimbabwe, like Blessings and her family, have had their lives transformed.

# Action for Fairer Tea - Brew it Fair
