We start early in February, sending out notices to previous stallholders and to online sites encouraging newbies to hire. We also advertise in local free magazines and of course the ubiquitous posters in shops etc as well as social media.

We decided to repeat last year's format with tea and cake, with fewer Church stalls and were told not to expect the profit we made from last year's Market.

Well how wrong was that statement! Despite a dismal day initially, God sent us the sunshine, albeit later, and folk flocked from near and far to sample delectable cream teas with Church-made fresh scones and a hot drink plus a slice of cake from the ladies in the kitchen. The community purchased crafts from the visiting stallholders, as well as from our usual stalls of Homemade produce, Vintage items, Last chance stall and thanks to Marion a new stall entitled Accessories, which did a roaring trade. Very Quick Recipe for Microwave Choc Chip Cookies

Cooking brings Faith (Made on 4th May by Junior

Church)

Ingredients

1. 90g (about 4oz)butter/margarine

2. 2 tablespoons brown sugar

3. 4.5 tablespoons S.R.flour

4. 1 tablespoon chocolate drops + 3 extra per cookie to decorate

In addition 2 dinner plates lined with greaseproof paper

Recipe

Cream butter and sugar.

Gently stir in flour and chocolate drops (if too

dry add a drop of milk or water)

Bind together with hands and make a thick sausage shape.

Cut into 12 pieces, roll each piece into a ball and flatten.

Place around the outside edge of each dinner plate- 6 on each.

Decorate each with 3 chocolate drops.

Bake each plate in Microwave 800 for 1.5 minutes (adjust times for 900/650)

Cool and enjoy!!

Dear all,

This past month there were many moments of insight, connection, and joy across our churches. Each of these and other moments, large or small, should remind us of the rich life of our churches and the many ways we continue to be connected, encouraged, and renewed.

From Stepanka After one year and two months in my role, I attended my URC induction day called 'You're Welcome!' at the URC House in London. It was a very useful and informative day with four different sessions and lovely company of eight other participants. I took some helpful materials away to share with the churches.

We have interviewed a couple of applicants for the part-time Children's and Youth Worker position, but sadly neither of them have been selected due to their lack of experience. We are currently seeking feedback and advice from people in the youth work field and will be re-advertising again soon. Please continue to pray for the right candidate.

The May Market was a great community event, well supported by the pastorate. People from all three churches came to enjoy it, and some to help too. The event was well attended with a good number of visitors not just enjoying the lovely food and pretty stalls, but also visiting the Church sanctuary. The total amount received from the event was ...drumroll, please... £2,436.71, which is a record! Many thanks to all who helped on the day.

My focus from next week will be on supporting people whose Safeguarding Foundation training and DBS checks are still outstanding to complete them by the end of June. We are grateful to all those involved in this process for their help in keeping everyone safe.

From Mark I attended the Ministers' Spring School, where ministers from our Synod of Thames North and from Eastern Synod gathered, along with two visiting ministers from the Czech Republic (Stepanka's home country). Our theme was Inter-related: Church as a Community of Difference. A highlight for me was the Bible Study where we focussed on finding what is hidden and bringing it to the centre. We explored the lives of those who worked with Paul particularly Phoebe, Priscilla and Aquila, Junia, and Tertius, and considered how their relationships, experiences, and contributions shaped Paul's letters and ministry. In addition to the rich Bible study, we looked at themes such as intergenerational worship, intercultural identity, and how our varied lives and perspectives intersect within the life of the church. These conversations, both formal and informal, were a reminder of the strength that comes from learning and sharing together as colleagues.

At Broxbourne May Market, I hosted a table promoting the life and activities of our churches. Though only a few visitors stopped by while I was there, some flyers were taken, and meaningful conversations were had. If we try this again, I hope to create more of a draw to encourage greater engagement. The sanctuary was kept open throughout, and many appreciated the chance to sit quietly or ask questions—something I believe was valued by those who came through.

Also at Broxbourne, I attended the Friday Celtic prayers led by Jill. This was a deeply meaningful time of prayer, shaped by thoughtful and contextually rich reflections. I would warmly encourage you to come along if you are able. It is a gentle and grounding way to close the week.

At Hertford, the annual Art Exhibition brought vibrant life to the church hall. It was a joy to see such creativity on display and to celebrate the gifts of artists within the community. Alongside this, the Hot Potato Lunch was very well attended. It is a warm and lively gathering, full of conversation and shared appreciation over a simple, delicious meal.

At Cheshunt, we shared a joyful afternoon of music, song, and dance as Yinka Williams performed. Her energy and talent created an uplifting atmosphere, and it was wonderful to gather together for such a life-affirming event.

Looking ahead, Cheshunt will be opening its doors to the wider community for a free Coffee Morning on Saturday 24th at 10:00am (flyer attached). This is a lovely opportunity to meet new people, welcome neighbours, and simply be present in the heart of the community. All are warmly invited.

Mark writes:

June Prayer Themes - Life in the Spirit



This month, our prayers follow Pentecost and the movement of the Spirit in our lives and in the world. They invite us to remain attentive, courageous, and open to the ways God is forming us as a community of love, peace, harmony and renewal.

Week 1: Waiting with Hope

Scripture: "They all joined together constantly in prayer..." (Acts 1:14)

Focus: Pray with confidence as you wait on God's guidance. Hold before God all who are seeking clarity, and give thanks that even in the waiting, God is present and preparing the way.

Week 2: Welcoming the Spirit

Scripture: "All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit..." (Acts 2:4)

Focus: Ask for a renewed awareness of the Spirit's presence in your life and in the life of our church.

Pray for a readiness to embrace what God is offering and for joy in what is unfolding.

Week 3: Speaking with Grace, Listening with Love

Scripture: "Each one heard them speaking in their own language." (Acts 2:6)

Focus: Pray for conversations that bring understanding and connection. Ask for the Spirit's guidance in listening deeply and speaking with kindness, especially in places where healing is needed.

Week 4: Living by the Spirit

Scripture: "The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace..." (Galatians 5:22–23)

Focus: Pray for your life to be shaped by the Spirit's gifts. Lift up our church community, asking God to strengthen us in patience, generosity, and faithfulness as we serve and grow together.



Amanda's Eco-hint for June

June already!

It's been a dry Spring. Reservoirs will be getting low. So save water every way you can. Put a Water Hippo in your toilet tank to reduce the flush.

Try 'if it's yellow, let it mellow.

If it's brown, flush it down.'

Save bath/shower water and use it to flush the toilet.

Simple, but just don't leave the tap running. Turn it off, eg whilst cleaning your teeth.

Don't wash the car. Or the patio.

Save rainwater every way you can.

Prioritise acid-loving plants and plants such as astilbes which

needs damp soil.

Use a bowl when using the tap. Use washing up water to water plants. Soapy water actually deters plant pests.

Remember birds and wildlife generally may be struggling to find drinking water. They can't drink soapy water, so would appreciate a bowl of fresh drinking water. And a container of sand to have a dust bath and clean their feathers.

Look out for migrants birds arriving. Especially swifts and swallows. Hopefully some will use the nesting boxes put up at the Church.

Avoid cutting back hedges or ivy, as there could be nesting birds or young ones hidden in there, and you could frighten the parents away.
